

PUT YOUR RETIREMENT PLAN TO WORK

He did talk *with* us about some important issues. Starting off by asking “How many of you have been contacted by your investment firm about fiduciary rule changes to take effect June 9, 2017 that will change the way investment firms are compensated with your money?” Keep in mind, this presentation was on May 25th. Only two hands were raised among the twenty-something people in attendance.

Kurt spent time explaining how this new fiduciary rule would change (IRA, 401k, Roth IRA) retirement account management fees from a transaction based service to a fee based. Most people make few transactions (trades) per month, if any, or even in a year. Those people would have fewer fees assessed to their account but, with the new rules proposed, all accounts will be fee based. Meaning, most people will be charged more money annually to have their retirement funds “managed”. Kurt urged each of us to contact our financial advisor or the company handling our retirement accounts and ask how these changes may affect us and what alternatives there are to fee based accounts.

Kurt addressed another important topic – “legal trusts”. He asked how many of us had a trust or even a will set up to handle our estates. Only a few more hands were raised. Kurt gave us a few examples of the benefits of a trust. Especially important is giving control and establishing your wishes of what is to happen to your hard earned money should you be incapacitated and/or after you die.

Be pro-active. That is a phrase used several times as a way to empower us; he also encouraged us to not procrastinate about our retirement money. It doesn’t have to be millions of dollars to be important enough to take power and be pro-active. Talk to a financial advisor and find out what can be done to get the best results for your financial situation.

Kurt said that we all have different expectations in our life and in our retirement, so we should review our “retirement date” and determine whether our actions align with our goals. As we have all heard many times, and Kurt emphasized, we should always maximize contributions to our retirement accounts, *especially* if our company offers matching contributions; and, we should make “catch-up” payments if possible.

After his presentation, Kurt stayed around and answered more questions that people may have felt uncomfortable asking in from of the group. I know of one person who followed up on Kurt’s advice to become more *pro-active*. They have combined several 401k accounts and have begun forming a trust for their estate plan.

DRIVER SAFETY TIPS

- Use a seat belt in every seat, on every trip, no matter how short.
- Make sure children are always properly buckled in the back seat in a car seat, booster seat, or seat belt, whichever is appropriate for their age, height, and weight.
- Choose not to drive while impaired by alcohol or drugs, and help others do the same.
- Obey speed limits.
- Drive without distractions, such as using a cell phone or texting.
- Remember to allow sufficient time for going from Point A to Point B.

PENSACOLA DAM FIELD TRIP

Upon arrival at the Pensacola Dam, we were given some free time to look at pictures of the dam being built. Our guide, Roy, has been giving tours of the dam for seven seasons. Most tours start Memorial Day weekend, but private tours will be given upon request.

We then watched a video about the dam. The Grand River starts by Miami, OK and travels 67 miles to the Pensacola Dam. The water then flows on into Ft. Gibson Lake and continues flowing downstream into the Arkansas River. Electricity can be made 10 times per day at various points along the river. Water is pumped back into storage at night when the cost and demand is lower.

The Grand River Dam Authority (GRDA) is a conservation and reclamation district and is a governmental agency of the State of Oklahoma that has the control of storing, preserving and distributing the waters of the Grand River.

Henry Holderman had the idea for the dam in the 1880s, but a group of businessmen known as the "Rainbow Chasers" took up the cause in the 1930s. Using their own money, the Rainbow Chasers made several trips to Washington, D.C., lobbying for government assistance to build this dam.

The residents of Vinita made a law that if any standing president came through town, the president had to stop for 15 minutes; this law was created after they heard that President Franklin Roosevelt might be coming through town. The residents took this opportunity to convince President Roosevelt that this dam needed to be build. In 1937, their lobbying paid off. President Roosevelt authorized \$28.5 million toward building the Pensacola Dam. Towns, farms and cemeteries had to be moved – a total of 50,000 acres was claimed in order for the Lake O' Cherokees to built.

Lights were brought in so they could work around the clock. They poured concrete for 20 months, and the dam was finished in 33 months with the help of 3,000 workers. Fourteen workers died during the building of the dam. They used the same type of safety nets that were used in the building of the Golden Gate Bridge. This was the first in a long line of economic history for the area. The towns of Langley and Disney boomed.

Governor Red Phillips didn't like the idea of the dam, but a year later it became reality. The dam is on the National Registry of History Places. It is the longest dam with multiple arches in the world. There are 51 arches with 21 spillways. The dam is 150 feet above the river bed. There are 21 flood gates at Disney, with a total of 42 flood gates, 21 over the lake. The day we visited, there were 8 gates open.

In 1941, the US entered World War II and the dam was used for the war effort. It was 5 years before the dam was returned to the state on August 31, 1946. It is easy to maintain and to keep clean. There are hydroelectric plants in Oklahoma. There are also 2 coal fired plants at Choteau. The water coming in is monitored to maintain the level of the lake. The generators create 130 mw each, and there are 6 generators in total. They sell electricity wholesale. One generator will supply about 45,000 people, or an area the size of Broken Bow. All 6 generators can supply Stillwater. There is a turbine on display outside of the main building.

Grand Lake O'the Cherokees is 66 miles long. The lake is 45,000 surface acres, and has 1,300 miles of shoreline. Activities to be enjoyed include boating, skiing, water boarding, and fishing. GRDA ecosystems have an economic and environmental impact on a 4-state region. The fish habitat is built by volunteers. They are given some of the habitat for their own use. Old habitats used concrete blocks, but they now use pvc with a little concrete to weight it down.

The Pensacola Dam employs 30-40, and the GRDA employs 350 total. They have an influence in 75 of the 77 Oklahoma counties. The lake is 755 feet above sea level. Pensacola is 2 feet over datum. The lake has a depth of 130 feet, with an average depth of 39 1/2 feet. Water has never flowed over the top of the dam. If water should go over the top of the dam, it would cause erosion.


Water flows into the lake from Kansas and Missouri. If the water level of the lake gets one foot above normal, it is under control of GRDA. After that, the flood gates are under control of the Army Corps of Engineers. GRDA has to have permission from the Army Corps of Engineers to open the flood gates.

Next, we drove to the bottom of the dam and saw the control room. It is remotely operated, but can be operated manually. We walked through the building that houses the control room, generators, and the rest of the equipment. We saw the river, and there were fish that were at the base of the dam. The generators inside the control building spin at 150 rpm and can produce electricity in 35 seconds from when it is started. Our guide, Roy, told us that Pensacola is the Native American word for "pretty flowers."

We then drove over the dam to the flood gates, and watched the water pour out of the dam to go downstream. It was very loud, and they have warning signs that the water rises very quickly. They have alarms that will sound when this happens as a warning to enable people to get to higher ground quickly.

We drove through Choteau to the Miller Farm, where we had an Amish lunch of homemade rolls, fresh butter, green beans, Cole slaw, dressing, noodles with chicken broth, oven-fried chicken, pot roast, mashed potatoes and gravy, and a dessert of coconut cream or lemon meringue pie. They served the meal family style, and made sure we had plenty to eat. After the meal, we were able to buy some of their homemade products, such as noodles, barbeque sauce, and apple butter. Fresh eggs were also available for purchase.

It was an amazing trip, and we each came away with greater knowledge of what it takes to create a man-made lake, tap a raging river for electrical power, and the value of foresight for economic benefit from our elected officials. The Pensacola Dam is certainly a beautiful and powerful site well worth the visit.



THE GIANT TURBINES - A VIEW OF WIND ENERGY

OSAGE WIND FARM

At the recent Region VI meeting, the Tulsa club offered a field trip to the Osage Wind Farm in Burbank, Oklahoma. Two dozen eager Desk and Derrick members clambered aboard vans and headed northeast to the Osage Wind Farm. The wind farm is approximately 13 miles west of Pawhuska. Situated on 8,400 acres, the farm has 84 wind towers. The turbines loom from afar but upon a closer approach, it is truly an amazing sight. Inside the headquarters, our tour guide gave us background and detail of the wind operation there. The farm was constructed by Enel Green Power North America (an Italian company) and is owned 50/50 by that company and Osage Wind, LLC. It became operational in the summer of 2015. Each turbine cost approximately \$2 million each to construct. The size of the farm is 150 megawatts.




The turbines are over 400 feet tall with three blades measuring 50 yards each. Standing in front of one is impressive. Trying to look up at the height of the turbine was difficult because without holding onto something, falling over backwards was the result for many of us! The tower is built so tall because winds are stronger higher from the ground. A wind turbine works the opposite of a fan. It uses wind to make electricity instead of electricity making wind. The wind turns the blades around a rotor which is connected to the main shaft. The shaft is connected to a generator which makes electricity. The electricity then travels down the tower to a transformer which it is converted to AC or DC voltage. Wind measurements are collected to automatically rotate the turbine blades to face the strongest wind and angle or "pitch" the blades to optimize the energy captured. This farm provides power for approximately 56,000 homes.

Donning hard hats and safety glasses, our group had a look at the inside of the turbine tower. Access to the very top is done by a straight vertical ladder which is manually climbed by the maintenance worker and his tools are brought up by a pulley. Maintenance is important for the turbine – not only for general repairs but also to clear out spider nests and webs which clog up the nose and interfere with operation. Workers for turbine maintenance are in great demand as the industry is growing rapidly. These turbines also can survive vicious storms without damage which makes them a good fit for Oklahoma.



From the wind farm, we continued onto Pawhuska for a delightful lunch and shopping at the Pioneer Woman's Mercantile. This Mercantile has re-energized the town of Pawhuska and it is no longer a sleepy village! On the drive back, we took a short detour to the town of Barnsdall to view the only standing oil and gas pump situated in the middle of a neighborhood street. Quite a sight!

This field trip was so educational and fun! It was thoroughly enjoyed by all.


