
Annual President's Report 2018

The recommendations from a special Ad Hoc committee were approved by the 2018 Board and will help us move forward for 2019, with the following changes to the Special Committees list. Philbrook Museum of Art By Ann Mefford

A little rain could not detour our group from going on our field trip to the Philbrook Museum of Art in Tulsa, Oklahoma on Saturday, October 13, 2018. We braved the drive and arrived early to enjoy browsing in the gift shop until our docent, Mary Kathryn Dentiste, arrived to show us around. Mary was a joy to listen to as she told about the Phillips family history and living across the road from some of the family.

The Phillips family consisted of four brothers: Frank and L.E. (of Phillips Petroleum fame) and younger twin brothers Waite and Wiate. When they were 16 years old the twins went west to explore and work their way around the country. Then, in July 1902, Wiate died suddenly of a ruptured appendix. Waite brought him back home to be buried.

Waite's brothers sent him to business school and later hired him to work for them. In 1914 Waite knew enough of the oil business that he started his own company, Waite Phillips Company. He included refineries, tank cars and gas stations in his business. His everything-oil approach was noted by an investment firm on Wall Street and in 1925 they purchased his company for \$25 million.

Waite and Genevieve had more wealth than the family could ever use, so in 1925 they began giving away half of everything they earned. "Real philanthropy consists of helping others, outside our family circle, from whom no thanks is expected or required" from "Waite Phillips Epigrams." The Phillips did this many times in their lives. They donated more than 120,000 acres in New Mexico to the Boy Scouts of America, complete with bison, sheep, horses and much more.

The Villa Philmonte was built in 1926-1927 for Waite Phillips and wife, Genevieve as their summer home. They lived in the home for ten years with children Helen Jane and Elliott. The Villa was constructed of iron and concrete and designed with an Italian Renaissance style, costing about \$1.2 million at the time. It was donated to the city of Tulsa in the mid-1930s as a gift to the city. The family wanted to establish it as an art center and museum. The Phillips financed the remodel of the home to make it climate controlled and protect the art, and it became the Philbrook Museum of Art.

Walking through the museum you can see the detail and care taken to make it a spectacular home. Every room had a special detail. like the music room's murals, the fountains with the figures, and a one-of-a-kind, multi-colored, light-up dance floor. It originally held a white grand piano and a harp.

The gardens were grand and boasted coves for quiet reflection, flowers, and plants, and in the summer, produce that is donated to the local food bank. Every aspect of the home was carefully planned and carried out to perfection. Waite Phillip's family left behind a gift the will be cherished by many generations to come.





BATTLING OPEC

For many years, OPEC has held the world in its palm, influencing and often controlling the production and pricing of oil and gas around the world. All of the companies listed below conduct operations in OPEC member countries, and those countries do govern how many barrels of oil can be produced in their countries. Five of the top twelve producing countries are OPEC member nations and include Russia, which is considered an OPEC ally. This puts them ahead of the production of the United States, China, Canada, and Brazil combined, and when you add the remaining member nations (Venezuela, Nigeria, Angola, Qatar, Algeria, Libya, Ecuador, Republic of Congo, Equatorial Guinea, and Gabon, plus allies Mexico and Kazakhstan) they have the advantage.

The United States, once the oil and gas giant, no longer has the largest oil and gas production companies in the world, with only two companies in the top twelve (Exxon Mobil and Chevron). And OPEC, although it has 15 member nations, no longer has even one of their companies in the top twelve.¹

Russia has the top two companies, Gazprom (privately owned with the Russian government being the major shareholder; as of 2011 the company was on record for production of over 17% of the world's total gas production), and Rosneft (owned by the Russian government; deals primarily in the exploration and production of gas products).

The U.S. ranks third with Exxon Mobil. Exxon and Mobil merged in 1999 and has the largest petroleum production in the world, with a daily capacity of 6.3 million barrels. However, it currently only produces 3.921 million barrels daily, placing it slightly below the two Russian companies.

China comes in as number four with PetroChina Company Limited, a Chinese company owned by the Chinese government. It has also been listed as #8 on the Forbes 2000 World's Leading companies.

BP P.L.C., a British company headquartered in London, England comes in as fifth. It operates in 72 different countries and has the largest turnover globally. And FYI, BP also has over 18,000 service stations around the world to distribute their petroleum products. Additionally, BP also is a leader in biofuels and wind power production.

Coming in sixth is Royal Dutch Shell which is incorporated in the UK but headquartered in the Netherlands. In 2013, this company was ranked #1 by Fortune 500 Global when its profits rose to an equivalent of 84% of the total GDP of the Netherlands. Royal Dutch Shell has operations in more than 70 countries, has over 44,000 service stations globally. Royal Dutch Shell also holds 50% of the shares of Raizen, a Brazilian company ranked as the third largest in the country, and is also a major ethanol producer.

Number seven is Chevron, an American company headquartered in San Ramon, California, although its major operations cover areas not just in the Western US and US Gulf Coast but also in South Africa, Australia, South Korea, and Southeast Asia.

Petrobras is a Brazilian corporation headquartered in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, also known as Brazilian Petroleum Company, and comes in as number eight. Petrobras' core business includes exploration of oil and gas, refining and production, as well as distribution. Additionally, Petrobras is also involved in production of bi-fuel products. Petrobras has 92% of its production efforts on Brazilian soil, but also distributes to other countries outside of Brazil.

Another Russian company (this makes THREE in the top twelve!) is at number nine. Lukoil is a Russian oil and gas company headquartered in Moscow. It holds 1.3% of the total gas and oil reserves across the world, estimated at 19.3 million barrels. It operates in 40 countries around the globe, and its operations range from exploration to the sale of petroleum products.

Number ten, Total S.A., is a French company whose operations began in 1924 following the first world war, and is one of the oldest companies in the industry. Total has operations in more than 130 countries across the world, with an employee force of 96,000.

Statoil, number eleven, is a multinational oil and gas production company with its headquarters in Stavanger, Norway. Statoil is credited for over 60% of all oil and gas operations in the Norwegian continental shelf and operates the major production fields in the region.

And finally, number twelve is ENI. ENI is an Italian company dealing with oil and gas products and is headquartered in Rome. ENI is estimated to operate in roughly 79 countries globally and deals with the drilling and sale of oil and gas products to some of the leading suppliers across the world.

These are the top twelve oil and gas producing companies, and you'll notice that none is owned by any of the OPEC nations, although they may all do business in these countries. However, **by country**, the top twelve **oil-producing** countries are seen below ([Wikipedia](#), List of Countries by Oil Production, 11/28/18)²:

So how does a single nation challenge them? How do we break the chains with which OPEC binds us?

Right now, the U.S. is producing sky's-the-limit-output, even though there has been a softer demand globally. OPEC created huge issues by flooding the market in 2014 which then crashed the market. This consequently caused the U.S. shale producers to cut costs across the board, making them so lean that they could still thrive despite the lower oil prices. Then, when the prices recovered, so did U.S. drilling.

In less than a decade, our U.S. companies have drilled over 114,000 wells in just the Permian basin located in West Texas and part of New Mexico. Many of these wells can turn a profit, even if crude oil prices were to drop as low as \$30/barrel. This is OPEC's worst nightmare. Subsequently, one new pipeline in the area came online earlier than expected, with three new pipelines coming on line in 2019 to move this oil for distribution. Since there has been a bottle neck of oil waiting to be moved, rail cars and even trucks have been utilized to ship oil out of the region until those pipelines come online.

The Permian is booming. In just August of this year, U.S. oil production has had the largest annual increase in 98 years! Their total output of 15.9 million barrels **a day** was more than either Russia or Saudi Arabia! That means that the American Energy Industry added, in crude and other oil liquids, roughly three million barrels per day, putting it at nearly equal to what the country of Kuwait produced in the **same month** a year ago!

Companies operating in the Permian are drilling wells, but they aren't fracking very many of them yet. Rather than flood the terminals with oil that can't be moved, those wells are becoming an in-ground reservoir just ready to tap once the new pipelines are completed and are online.

There is one caveat, however; the need to ship overseas. With terminals in the port towns of Corpus Christi and Houston, Texas nearly full, all of those beautiful barrels of oil could pile up with nowhere else to go for a while.

With U.S. oil production expected to rise to 17.4 million barrels a day (U.S. Energy Information Administration), American net imports of petroleum are expected to fall to just 320,000 barrels a day, **the lowest since 1949**. The entire oil-trading community expects that by 2022, perhaps for just a single week, the U.S. will become a **net** oil exporter, something that hasn't happened in nearly 75 years!

So where does this leave OPEC? The Saudis have conceded that there is going to be a day of reckoning. OPEC estimates that, in order to balance the market and avoid an increase in their own oil inventories, it needs to pump just 31.5 million barrels a day in the coming year, down by 1.4 million barrels a day than October.


So far, global oil demand has managed to absorb the extra U.S. crude, which has limited the impact on prices. Since Venezuela and Iran have lost much of their output due to sanctions, Saudi Arabia, Russia and a few others have actually boosted **their** production to compensate. The bad news for OPEC? The U.S. shale production revolutionized by hydraulic fracturing remains the monster under the bed that keeps them up at night.³




