#### Why is BOB in Your Gasoline?

Tim Parrish did an excellent job explaining the way gas is refined and processed. Researching the history of the first oil products, the engines, and the refining process he enlightened us to things we had not heard of in any of our other meetings.

The first crude oil was processed as kerosene in 1859 and it was 1893 before we had the first American car using gasoline. It was called the Duryea and was not the first car; that one was produced as the Carl Benz in Germany.

The basic engine that runs on gas products consist of a four stroke process: induction, compression, power and exhaust. The first step is the release of fuel into the engine. Then compressing the fuel in the chamber. A spark is introduced causing an explosion of power. The chamber is open and the exhaust is released. The process is repeated as long as the fuel is supplied or until the engine is turned off.

Of the 129 refineries in the U.S. Oklahoma has 5 refineries that combine to process about 524 thousand barrels per day. In 2022 Oklahoma was the sixth largest producer of crude oil with our state consuming 1/3 of the energy it produces. The state also produces three percent of the total United States refining capacity.

The process for refining the crude oil is to heat it and allow the different products to separate. BOB is the unfinished gasoline blend that only lacks the addition of the ethanol to be finished gas. BOB stands for Blendstock Oxygenate for Blending. The types of gasoline are based on the octane fuel levels generally: regular is 87, midgrade 89-90, and premium 91-94.

There are even different types of BOB:

RBOB – Reformulated Blendstock Oxygenate for Blending

CBOB - Conventional Blendstock Oxygenate for Blending

CARBOB - California Conventional Blendstock Oxygenate for Blending

EUROBOB – Eurobob Conventional Blendstock Oxygenate for Blending

What is Blendstock? An unfinished product that is blended with other similar unfinished products to make a refined product.

What is Oxygenate? It is a process to impregnate, combine or supply something with Oxygen.

Pros of Oxygenates can enhance fuel combustion and reduce exhaust emissions and some also boost gasoline octane.

Cons Oxygenates are almost always alcohol based and can harm calibrations since they burn at different rates, temperatures and produce less power.

BOB was a result of the Clean Air Act of 1970, requiring the reduction 90% of new car emissions and banning lead in gasoline and was completed in 1996. It also created the EPA and more cleaner burning requirements for automakers.

When I went on vacation I left my job and everyday things behind. I had no internet or phone service for the whole eight days of cruising. I learned you never really turn your mind off of things you know and you learn more every day. In Galveston, Texas I looked out over the side of the ship and saw this tanker going by and was glad it was making a journey and supply someone far away.

My husband and I went to Key West Florida and then cruised on to Freeport, Grand Bahama island. We enjoyed the trolley ride around the island. There were people driving all around and it never occurred to me how they got the gas for their cars. It was an island and no roads to the refineries.

Our next stop was Half Moon Cay where we took an open air truck ride around the island to learn its history. I was surprised to learn that all the electricity was produced by gas powered generators. We had to take a smaller boat to get to the island because of how shallow the ocean was in the area. So they were using smaller boats and bringing fuel in by the barrels. They also had a few electric golf carts they used to move their people around. Our guide also said that the island she lived on was an hour away by boat so she and almost everyone else but the 20, people who lived on the island had to commute for work every day.




Nassau our last island stop was a big island 21 miles long and 7 miles wide. I saw lots of oil storage tanks from our ship. Now I had a good idea of why so many were needed to keep the island going. We had gotten a private van tour and Sheila told us the history of the island and how the people lived. She said during the COVID time they had a very hard time getting any supplies shipped in to them and people were still trying to recover from it. Nassau's main income is tourism so it was a major blow for them. She said a box of Cheerio cereal was eight dollars and gas was over six dollars a gallon because everything has to be shipped in. When we left I was able to get some pictures of how they unload fuel in the ocean to the tanks on the island. It was amazing to see and know that was how they survived everyday by what was delivered. I was wondering if the ship in Galveston was one of the ones the brought them their much needed fuel.
